

POSTDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Dr. Sean Hillier, York Research Chair in Indigenous Health Policy & One Health in the School of Health Policy & Management at York University is currently accepting applications for a postdoctoral position. Funded through the York University Provost's Postdoctoral Fellowship for Indigenous Scholars (<https://www.yorku.ca/gradstudies/postdoctoral-fellows/prospective-fellows/provosts-postdoctoral-fellowships/#IndigenousPPF>), the successful applicant will reside within the Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages as well as in the Faculty of Health.

Dr. Hillier's collaborative research program spans the topics of aging, living with HIV and other infectious diseases, and antimicrobial resistance, all with a concerted focus on policy affecting health care access for Indigenous Peoples in Canada. He has been successful in receiving funding from each of the three federal granting agencies.

The candidate can contribute to work in one or more of the following areas of research: Indigenous Peoples living with HIV/AIDS, One Health & Indigenous Peoples and Knowledge Systems, Indigenous Peoples & Aging, Health Policy.

Overview of Details:

- Amount: min. \$70,000/year
- Duration: 24 months. (Normally July to June. Exceptional start dates may be negotiated)
- Eligibility:
 - A completed PhD (2018 and after), or PhD completed by September 30, 2023 (with confirmed timeline for defence)
- Deadline to Apply: 01 March 2023
- Decision: 31 May 2023

The ideal candidate will:

- Execute research activities, including the design and implementation of projects;
- Develop research methods and objectives and conduct activities related to community-based participatory research projects;
- Contribute to and/or lead the preparation and submission of sound grant proposals and applications;
- Ensure that deliverables for each research project are identified, and the timeline is adhered to accordingly;
- Have experience with both quantitative and qualitative research methods;
- Use SAS and NVivo to analyze quantitative and qualitative data;
- Contribute to writing peer-reviewed scientific manuscripts;
- Interpret and re-write technical information regarding research techniques and outcomes to make them easier to understand to relevant stakeholders (community, government, funders, etc.);
- Consult with principal investigators, co-principal investigators, project partners, community stakeholders, and staff.

Eligibility

- Scholars who self-identify as Indigenous (limited to First Nations, Inuit, Métis Peoples). Indigenous persons living in or connected to the traditions, culture and/or language of the traditional territories which straddle the Canada - US border are eligible to apply
- Recently completed a PhD, PhD-equivalent, (degree completed between September 2018 and September 2023, with a possible extension of this window by up to a cumulative maximum of two years for career interruptions due to specific reasons.)
- International applicants (those whose traditional territories which straddle the Canada - US border) will require a work permit and Canadian Social Insurance Number in order to take up the postdoctoral position. Exceptional start dates may be negotiated in relation to the permit and visa process timelines.
